## AMAZING GRACIE!

The request came in December from Doberman Assistance Network. They were trying to help a very sweet 5 year old female who had not had the easiest life. The little female was very underweight and heartworm positive. We all took one look at that face and said we would help her.

We were not totally sure of Gracie's history. She was found running loose, very thin and a family tried to accommodate her but their resident dog would not accept her. When we got the request she had been taken in by some

very kind people at a shelter in Arkansas. The shelter workers adored her and wanted her to have a good life.

Gracie, however, had another secret that she kept carefully hidden until it was discovered by one of our veterinarians on her journey to Omaha. She had a hole in the roof of her mouth. Actually, it was more than a hole; it was a gash, at least a couple of inches long and fairly wide. Everyone had thought Gracie was thin because of being heartworm positive but the truth was that every time she ate or drank part of

the food or water went up into her sinus cavity and out her nose!

It was obvious that she had lived like this for some time and had learned to accommodate her injury until the vet was checking her over and opened her mouth wide and saw the hole. The doctors were certain that it was an injury and guessed that she had possibly fallen on something with such force that it broke bone in her hard palate and pushed it up into the sinus cavity.

After the discovery, Gracie was put on a soft diet and into her foster home while we waited for the orthopedic surgeon to take a look at her. We discovered that the hole could be repaired but it would take a specialist to do the surgery. Dr. Merkley made two skin grafts and patched the hole.

It has now been nearly two months since her surgery. Gracie has been adopted by her foster family and has a Dobie sister Cleo to play with. She is still learning what it is like to truly have a forever home but her parents say she learns new things every day. She recently discovered that she can cuddle on the sofa with her foster mom and

that was really a big moment. Gracie can now eat and drink without food and water squirting out of her nose and just be a regular dog and no longer has heartworm.

It took an incredible journey of love to get her here. A lot of people cared about her on the way from the moment she was found all of the way through the surgery and her subsequent adoption. People gave of their time and money and their hearts to save this amazing girl, many had never even met her in person. It all began 9 ½ yrs ago when I decided that I wanted a bigger dog that would be a good companion, smart, easy to train, and could help look after me and my home since I was on my own. So the fun began as I looked at various breeds. I did a lot of research and finally decided the Doberman was exactly what I was looking for but I studied it even more because I knew it was going to be a lifelong commitment and that is not to be taken lightly.

The search for the perfect Doberman began and after about six months I finally came across Zeus. When I first met him it was love at first sight and I thought “Oh my god! Look at the size of those paws and that body structure!” Something told me he was going to be huge and solid as a rock. Well, dynamite always comes in small packages. We came home and he fell in love with his little brother Skooter. The two of them became inseparable.

Now I was no fool. I knew training had to start immediately. And I knew if I wanted a Doberman to be what I wanted him to turn out to be it had to start with a lot of socializing. So for the first year of his life he went everywhere with me and he slept with me cause I had no choice if I wanted to get a good night’s sleep. We went to Petsmart and went visiting other friends and those who also had dogs. Socialization is so very important, that cannot be stressed enough! We grew a very tight bond together.

When he hit two years of age it became evident that he needed another playmate other than his little buddy. So off I went in search of a female Doberman. That’s when I discovered that there was actually a Doberman rescue. We went and met Tara and of course it was love at first sight, or at least it was for me, but Zeus didn’t think so! So the fun of establishing pack order began and it took awhile to sort out but over a period of several months they became glued to each other and gained a respect for each other.

As Zeus matured into a young man I started to see signs of just how close we were to each other. He could sense when I was sick and just not feeling up to par and started noticing how he would flip the pack around to a very quiet and gentle mood. One day I became very ill and was having problems walking. He was there for me to lean on him and help me walk and get out of the chair. I ended up having to have surgery and was gone for week. The day I got home I called my sister and told her to pick up my dogs because I missed them. She insisted that it was not a good idea and that I couldn't handle Zeus and he would hurt me by accident. Of course me not being able to handle my pack I think NOT. I told her that he was special and that he would know and everything would be ok. So after a lot of arguing she brought home my babies. When Zeus saw me he came running towards me. Of course my sister was in the back ground saying "I told you so." In a split second he stopped in front of me sniffed the air and me and walked on his tiptoes, turned to my side and looked up at me as if to say "I will help you walk and take care of you." No more "I told you so's" out of my sister – he told her, that's what! He helped me walk and get out of the chair. All I had to do was look at him and he knew I needed help. That was when I knew I had something special in the making.

And guess what we did. We became a foster family! Susie was his first foster sister. From then on he knew what his purpose was and it was great!

For anyone who is thinking of adopting and owning a beautiful Doberman, **please do the research on the breed.** They require a lot of socialization and it's a must right along with obedience training. These dogs are very loyal to family and will be there when needed. They are smart but they don't come to earth fully trained and just knowing what to do any more than humans do. They have to grow and learn and have good teachers willing to work with them! Please don't take it lightly or you will fail the dog and that would just be wrong. Rescue is full of dogs whose owners didn't go the extra mile and put in the work. Owning a dog is a great responsibility, it takes time and effort.
