*It was an early December day when I got the phone call none of us prefers to get. A dog was in need and not just the regular kind of need. This young fellow had a severe fracture in the radius and ulna on one of his front legs. He needed our help badly and needed it quickly as well.*

We had a conference as a group and within a few hours we had a foster and promises of funding to pay for the expensive surgery that Jonah would need. The volunteers did not even stop to think twice.

This baby's situation cried out to all of our hearts and those hearts answered the call and quickly.

That was our first miracle, the speed by which we found a foster willing to take an injured dog and the donors to pay for the surgery. Normally this takes time, but in the season of miracles things are different. Time moves in a pattern that is not like the rest of the year.

Our second miracle was that the shelter veterinarian found a surgeon who could do the special surgery needed. She worked tirelessly to find him in spite of all of the other patients she had to attend to. She was Jonah's first guardian angel as she made sure that he was securely delivered so that his leg could be repaired.

The surgeon did everything he possibly could to save Jonah's leg but the truth of the matter began to emerge as he actually viewed the damage: the fracture was not as new as they had thought. It was at least a couple of weeks old and the bones had started to grow and it made putting the leg back together impossible. He called me with the news and recommended that we amputate the leg.

I contacted one of the other officers in the group and Stephanie and I conferred with heavy hearts, as to what to do. We wanted Jonah to be out of pain, not subjected to a lifetime of arthritis when he was so young and vibrant. The doctor assured us both that in no time at all Jonah would not know that he was missing anything. We felt sick inside making that decision and the doctor too, felt badly, but he had gone above and beyond his duty to save the leg and it wasn't his fault at all.

Jonah was released from the hospital the



following day and went home to his foster mom who wasted no time in getting him settled in with the best loving care a dog can get. Lisa has a great heart for the dogs that are wounded and we needed her experience because we knew she could nurse him back to life. She took Jonah into her already busy

home without even stopping to second guess it. To her, there was just no question that he would be with her. When we had talked to her about fostering him her first question had been "How soon can I get him?"

When Lisa saw Jonah for the first time she wasn't prepared for how it would affect her emotionally at first but she took one look into those sad brown eyes and all of her protective instincts took over. She lifted him gently, all 63 pounds of him, and carried him to her vehicle for the ride home as if he weighed next to nothing but her heart was heavy for what had happened to him.

Within 30 hours after his surgery, Jonah began to walk with the encouragement of Lisa and the prayers of many. He is not focusing on the past but looking toward the future and the future looks bright. He knows he had many guardian angels who were provided with the abilities to help him and he is grateful for another chance at life. He plans upon living his life to the fullest as he waits for his forever home.

For all of us who were involved in this story we felt the miracle of Christmas working through the entire process. Jonah is thankful for the guardian angels that donated time, money and efforts to save him. Keep your eyes on this shooting star. He has a blessed life ahead of him for he was saved for a very special purpose. We all look forward to finding out exactly what that purpose will be. Stay tuned.



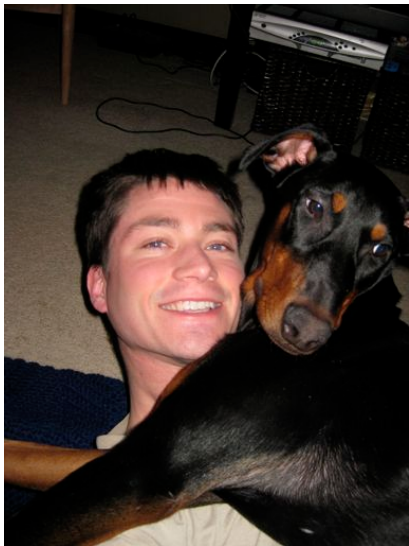


# Daisy, Duke and Ryan

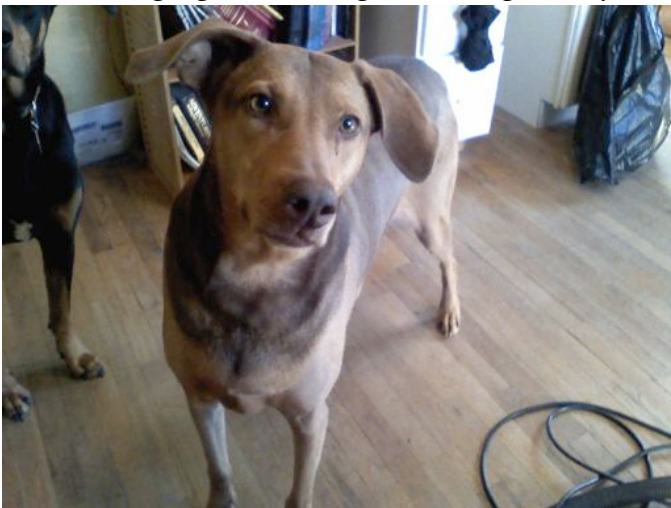

# It's All About The Pack *by Jack (Stephanie helped...)*

Hello Doberman fans. My name is Jack and my human loves Dobermans too. So much in fact that she has brought several home to become part of our family.

After going through the addition of several new furry friends in our house I consider myself somewhat of an expert on introductions and keeping each pack members status in order. I wanted to see if I could help the rest of you Doberman lovers like I helped my mom.

First of all it is important to consider you resident dog's personality along with the personality of the dog you are bringing home. Generally speaking, a resident male would acclimate better to a female however it is possible to have two resident males or two resident females if the one of the dogs is a little easier going and low key. This will help curb the possibility of the two same sex dogs challenging each other for position. Now a lot of people have the misconception

that only male dogs will challenge each other for position, I am here to tell you that is not the case. Don't tell mom but sometimes I think the girls are worse. It is also possible for a male to challenge a female for position, although this rarely happens.

Introductions are best done off of the resident dogs territory, I do much better when allowed to walk with the new pack member first. When mom and dad brought home Peanut my new brother they took us for a walk together first before he came in the house. It is important for us dogs to migrate as a pack it helps us promote a bond and have a common thread. Mom learned this lesson when she brought Dobber home. She was walking him separate and it seemed to her like he was an outcast in the pack it wasn't until we all started walking together that he became more comfortable with Regan and I and we accepted him as a new pack member.

The most important thing is how you humans as the pack alphas handle the situation. You must take a look objectively at the pack members and determine who is top dog and if they are fitting into that role well. Many times the pack order shuffles itself out just fine but there can be time where it is important for the human alpha

to intervene. The best way to convey this may be through my personal experience.

When mom first brought Dobber home things were ok but if we felt like mom was ill or feeling sad we both wanted to protect her. The interesting thing was that we both thought she needed to be protected from each other. The only issue I really had with Dobber is that he wanted to sleep in bed with momma too. That had been my spot since mom plucked me off the street and I wasn't a fan of sharing that spot with him. Dobber I think wanted me out of the bed too; he would growl and bare his teeth at me. Mom, because she knew Dobber and trusted him would turn her back to him and pretend to protect me from him (although I am sure I didn't need her help). This showed Dobber that Mom was not threatened by him and that I was a part of the pack that would be defended. It actually helped keep my pack status higher than his. This

little dance went on for a while and pretty soon Dobber could enter the bed without growling. Then I got a little big for my breeches and decided that I would growl at Dobber when he entered the bedroom. Mom would put me in my place by making me get out of bed sometimes she would banish me from the bed room for the night. I learned fairly quickly that only mom determines who gets to sleep with her and who doesn't. Now that we have 5 dogs mom likes to switch out who is sleeping in bed with her and Dad. You see we dogs see geographical height as status. So this way mom shows us the only two people who are in charge of this house are her and daddy.

Couches can be important to use too so mom pays close attention to who is on the couch. If a dog refuses to share the couch or give up its spot to a human the dog is not allowed on the furniture for several days. Ashes, Brandi and I always move when asked too once in a while my new brother Peanut and Regan won't and they are forcibly removed from the furniture.

Doorways and feeding times are very important in our house as well. When you have a pack it is very important that things run smoothly. Mom feeds the calmest dog first, most people will feed their dogs in pack order but mom does shuffle this a little in order to reward calm feeding times. Too much excitement around the food can cause problems with food

possession and we do not want everyone all wound up and trying to take other peoples food. When it comes to doors human should always be first in and first out followed by the top dog. This is where the obedience training comes in handy. Having a dog learn wait is a good idea so they know it is not their turn yet.

When Cutter came to our house mom was a little worried about bringing in a new male. I can be a little protective and territorial (not a Jack Russell right). Cutter was a great match for our family. He was a low key guy and really a lover not a fighter. I would get a little bossy with him because he was so sweet. I would stand and block him from going to certain parts of the house once in awhile to see if I could. Boy did mom get mad at me for that one mom is not a fan of bullying in the house. I would end up in the crate while he got to go to the couch or bed. I learned that lesson pretty quick.

My big sister Regan is the top female in the house she is bossy and pushy and she really tells all of us what to do. Sometimes she gets in trouble because she takes her duties a little too seriously. Mom makes sure she knows who really is number one. When Ashes came to the house she was afraid of Regan she may not have seen such a furry bossy dog before. When she got a little older she tried to challenge Regan

for her spot in the order. This did not go over well with mom or Regan. When a dog issues a challenge or a threat in the house mom puts them in banishment. No affection for 24 to 48 hours dependant on the severity of the infraction. Ashes was not allowed to sleep on any of the furniture she slept in her crate she was feed last, and still is, and no one would pet her or snuggle with her or even talk silly with her. She got food, water, training and exercise and that was it.

It seems to be a highly effective matter in which to deal with her issues. Mom uses that on us too but not as frequently because we are older and have learned those lessons.

The most important thing to know about pack order is that the human is always in charge. A good core of obedience training goes a long way to help this. If you form a strong bond with your dog and they will listen to your commands that makes a huge difference. Mom works with each of us individually and then also as a group because we all need to listen to her no matter what is going on.

I hope this information is helpful to all of you Doberman lovers and remember if you need my assistance I can be reach via my mom, Stephanie Auschwitz.

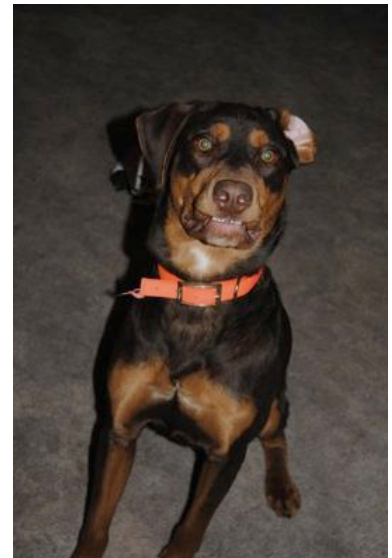

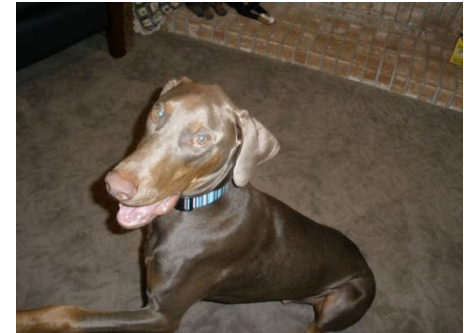

Kevin works odd hours, and I always felt safe with Jack around. When Jack passed it help to get through each day knowing that Claire was still with us, and I didn't have to face the full impact of losing my protector, because Claire cushioned the loss. But, when we found out that it was time for Claire to pass over, the emptiness hit with a full impact. I talked to my friends/volunteers, family, co-workers. Kevin & I shared precious memories of our beloved pets, but still I felt I needed more.



I've always been very intuitive so I've learned to trust my instincts. I started hearing about a "Psycic Andy" on the radio. I never believed that

I would need to seek help from a psychic, but I found out he was in the Omaha area. He was just starting out so he was reasonably priced. I went with my gut instinct, and set up a session time to talk with him. I was nervous, but when his dog greeted me at the door, I felt a sense of relief.

When we sat down, his dog laid across my feet, and remained there the whole 1/2 hour session. Andy did tell me some things that he would not have known about so I developed a trust. I asked him about Jack & Claire. I asked him if Claire knew how hurt I was when she passed over. He told me that it didn't matter which one passed first, but the other one would soon follow—Jack & Claire were that close. I felt like a huge burden had been lifted from my shoulders. I had been feeling guilty for being hurt that she passed, but what I didn't understand is that she was hurting more without Jack being around. She was so close to Jack that she felt lost without him. This allowed me to let go of that pain. It then allowed me to feel the pain of Jack not being in our lives anymore. I thought that I would never find another pet that was as "special" as Jack was as far as being my protector. Which then allowed me to let go, and accept the fact that we could find a pet who is just as "special". Yes, this was possible, and it was alright to move on.

Our new doberman, Ruger, does not replace Jack or Claire so I'm doing things differently with him. I take him on regular walks, he has different favorite toys, and I tell him I "love him" everyday which makes be feel good! If you scold him for anything, he will roll over on his back, and show you his "fabulous belly" making you forget what you were disciplining him for in the first place :)

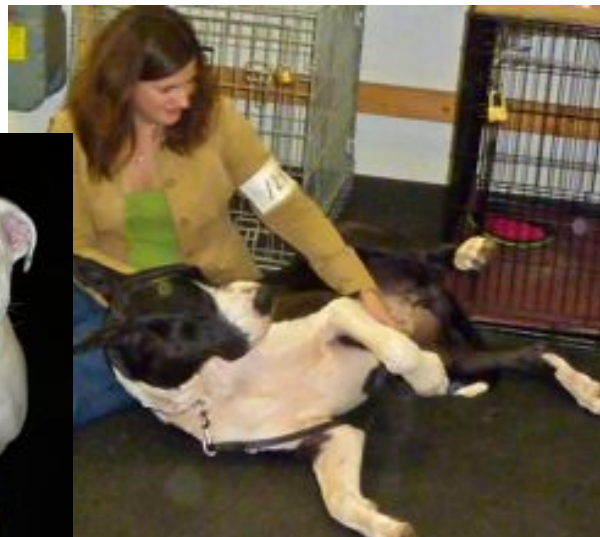

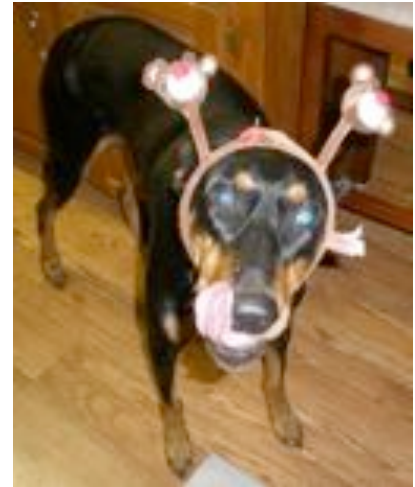

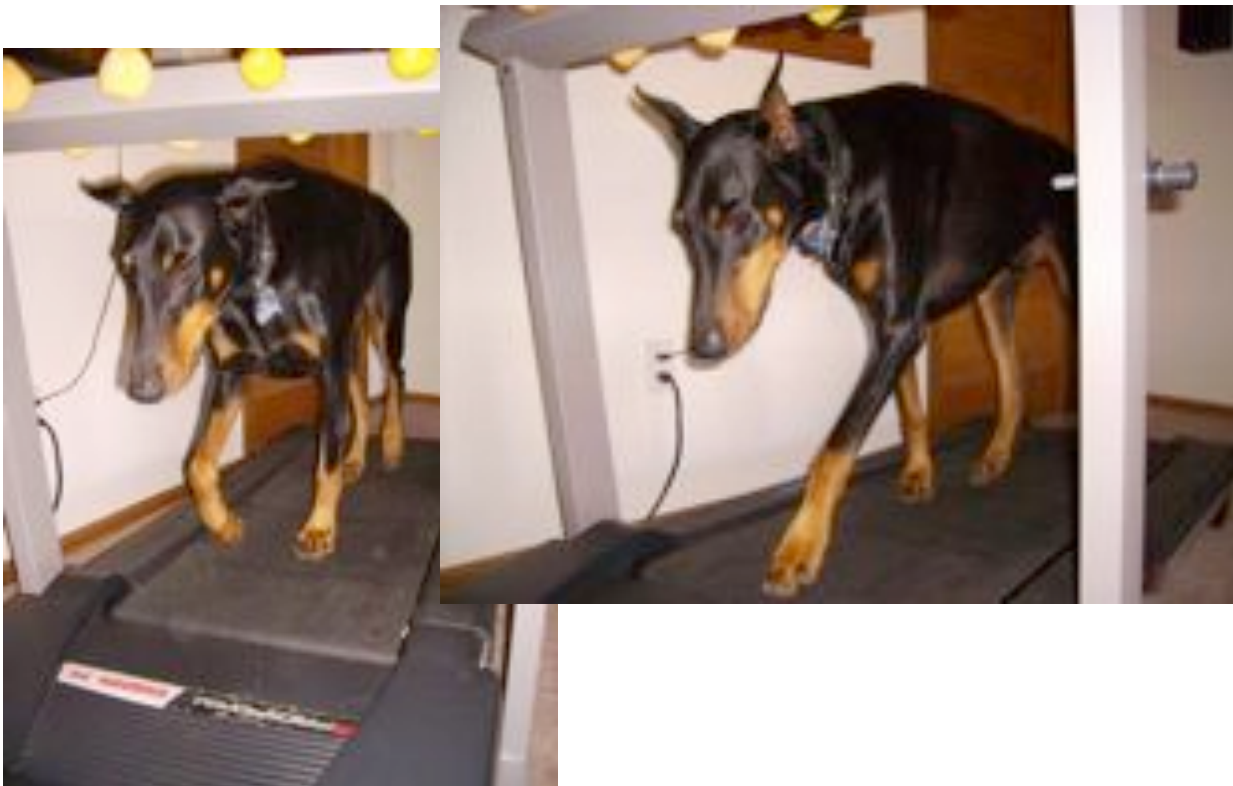
